- **Why Code Crossed the Line First:** Software engineering has a verifiable, binary notion of correctness (Does it compile? Do the tests pass?).
- **The Result:** Three people doing the work of fifteen. The empty chairs aren't a bug—they represent the fundamental restructuring of the SaaS business model.

The Broken Liability Chain



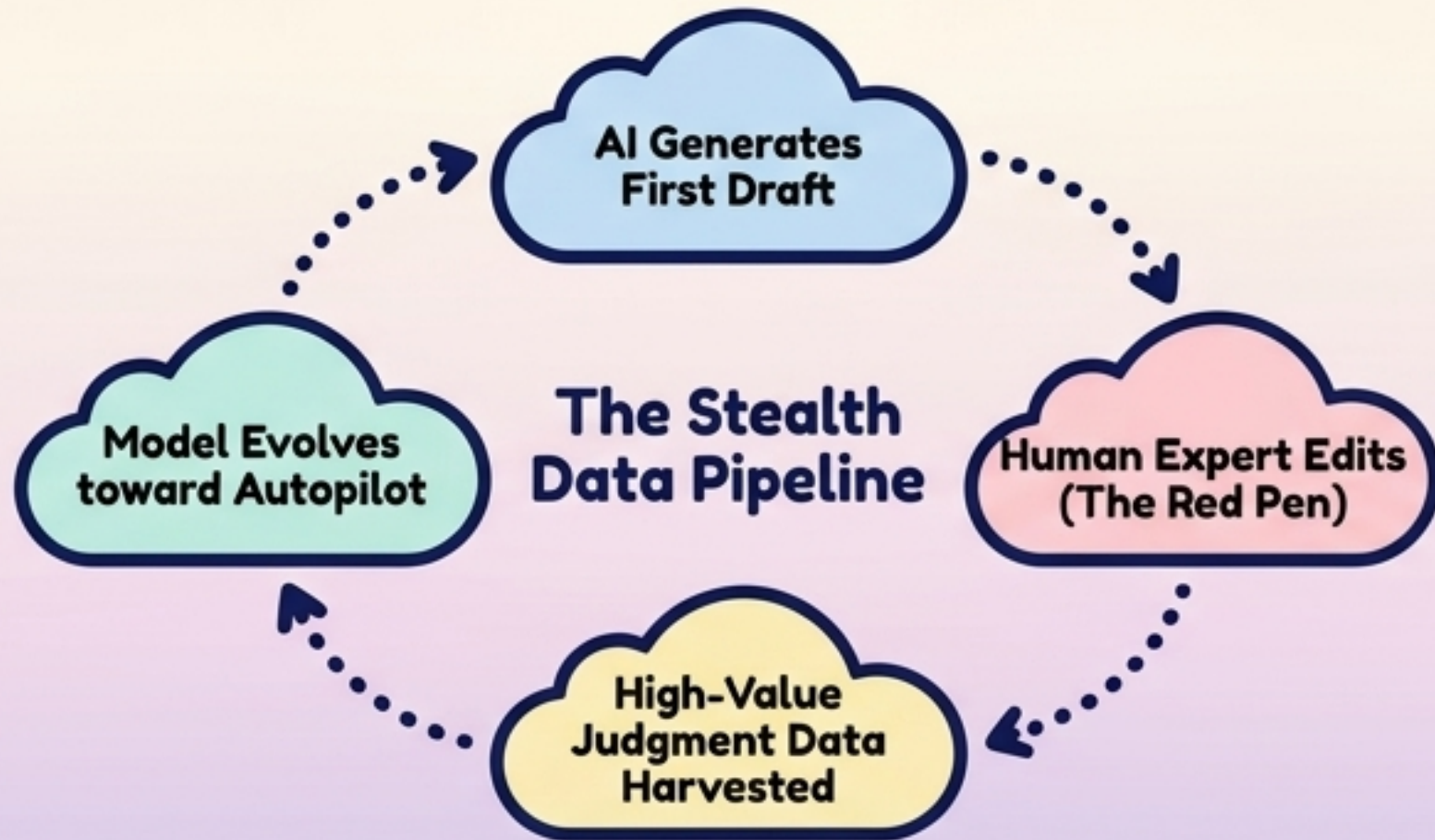
Copilot Mode: Clean liability. AI is a tool like Excel; the human professional signs off and takes the blame.

Autopilot Mode: The chain fractures. If an L3 autonomous AI underwrites a disastrous policy, no legal precedent for who pays.

The Insight: Technology runs, but institutions walk. Organizations cannot fully flatten until the legal attribution of AI failure is solved.

The Stealth Data Pipeline

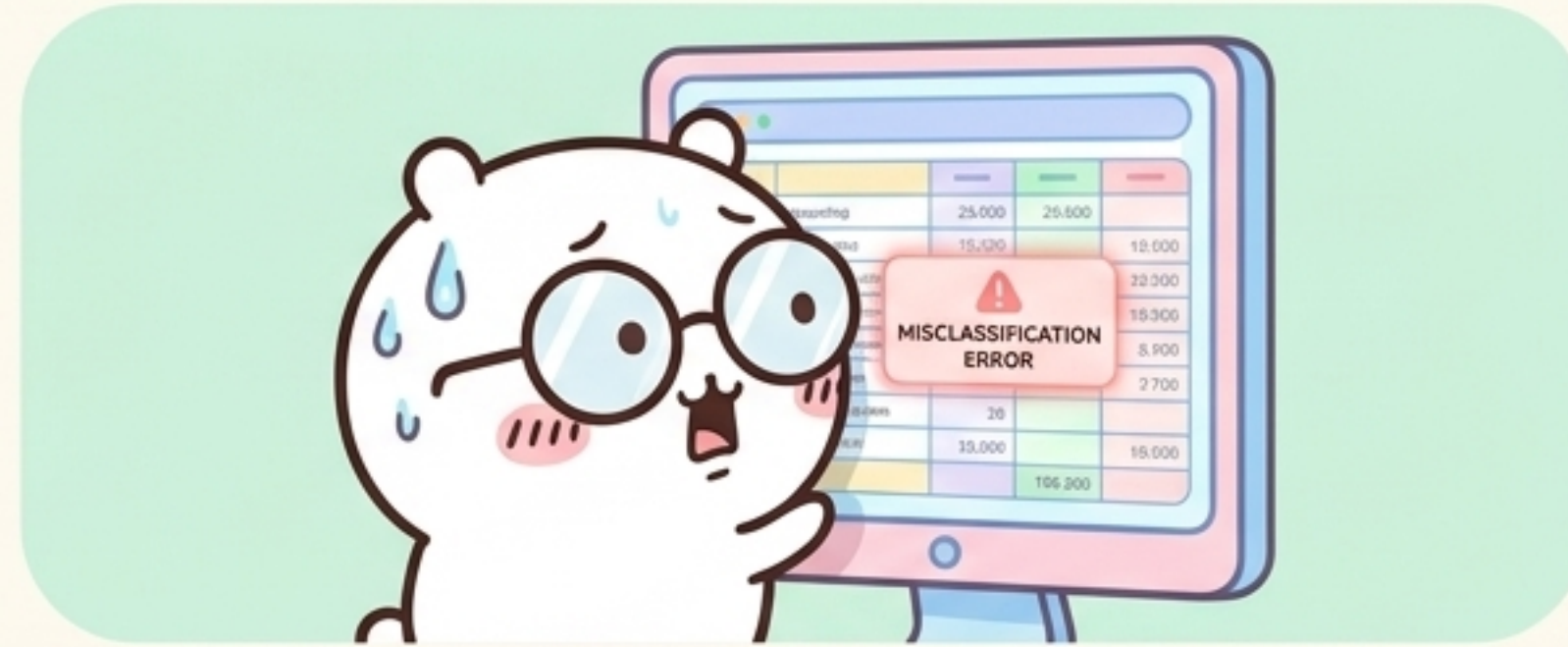


The Copilot Illusion: Users believe they are operating a tool. In reality, they are teaching it.

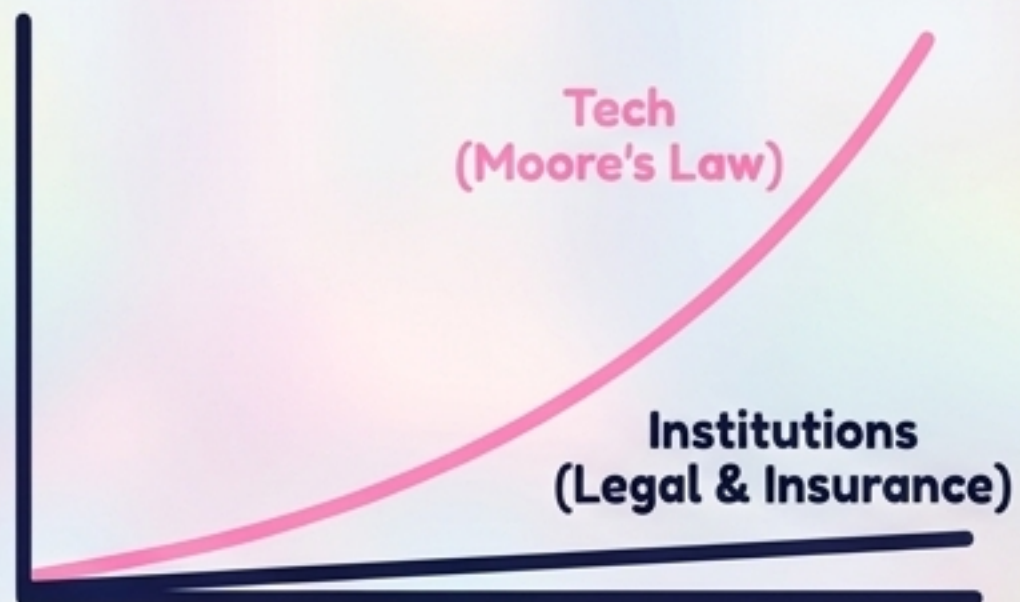

The Missing Category: The biggest SaaS opportunity isn't pure intelligence—it's building the **Trust Infrastructure** (authorization, evaluation standards, and audit trails) for ambiguous domains.

Tech Runs Fast, Institutions Walk



The Autonomous Analogy: L4 self-driving tech has been ready for years, but navigating state laws and liability takes a decade. AI knowledge work is harder: errors in contracts may not surface for years.

The 3-to-5-Year Verdict: Organizations won't become completely flat. We will settle at L3 Conditional Autonomy.

AI will handle 80% of routine information routing. Humans will retain exception handling and final accountability.
